Rethinking Law as a Driver of Inclusion, Equality and Sustainability

Content: *This panel proposes a critical recovery of the primordial, socioeconomic function of law as a foundation for rethinking equality, inclusion, and social sustainability. Starting from the observation that rights are frequently proclaimed in the very same contexts where violations and discrimination persist, the session interrogates the gap between formal legal frameworks and lived realities. By foregrounding structural contradictions — both at the geopolitical level and in everyday life — the panel outlines perspectives and strategies oriented toward gender equality and beyond, advocating for a more substantive, socially grounded conception of justice.*

Nurture/Nature: Cultivating Global Peace by Advancing Women's Health and Sustainable Development

Moderator: M. Soylu

Content: *This session argues that global peace cannot be meaningfully pursued without sustained investment in women's health and the ecological systems that support human life. Drawing on interdisciplinary research from public health, environmental studies, art history, and peace theory, it advances the premise that women's bodily well-being, environmental sustainability, and social stability are deeply interconnected rather than discrete policy domains. By situating women's health within a broader ecological and ethical context, the panel challenges militarized and reactive models of peace in favour of preventative, life-affirming strategies that link healthcare infrastructure, environmental stewardship, and gender equity as essential components of sustainable peace.*
